This makes the Duke de Nemours Regent, if Louis Phillippe dies first. The guardianship and tutorship of the young King belong to the Queen, or to the Princess mother whilst unmarried; and, in the event of her death, to the nearest female branch on the father's side not married. Some amendments were proposed, but they did not alter the features of the bill, and were passed.

GERMANY.—The German journals continue to be filled with accounts of conflagrations. On the 11th instant, the small town of Tambach, near Gotha was almost entirely consumed; 50 only, of the 500 houses of the place were left standing. The village of Bechtol, in Wirtemberg, had been likewise visited by a destructive fire, in which five children had lost their lives.

The Frankfort Journal announces the death of M. Isaac D'Essen, one of the heads of the German Israelite Congregation at Hamburg. Having no children, he bequeathed his fortune—amounting to 800,000 marcs banco (£80,000)—to charitable institutions in Hamburg, Altona, and Copenhagen.

LIVERPOOL, August 19.
 Since our circular by the last steamer, alarming disturbances and riots have broken out in the manufacturing districts. This was unexpected, as the improvement in trade and increased employment, together with the important reduction in the price of provisions, had greatly improved the condition and prospects of the population, and removed some uneasiness on this score, which prevailed two months ago. The disturbances commenced in a partial "turn out for wages" in one locality, and rapidly spreading throughout the whole cotton districts, have put nearly a total stop to all manufacturing operations for ten days past. It is however believed that a great majority of the operatives have turned out from compulsion, and are desirous of returning to work as soon as they can safely do so, and as the riot, in and near Manchester, have been in a great measure suppressed by a strong military force, it is hoped that general peace and order will shortly be restored. This impression prevails in Liverpool more generally and confidently we think than elsewhere, as shown by the state of the cotton market, but the disturbances have spread widely into Yorkshire, the Bottery district, and at this moment the state of the country is far from satisfactory. The brisk demand for cotton, noticed in our last circular, continued up the 10th instant and a large business was done producing a further advance of 1d per lb, in middling qualities. It was then suddenly checked by the disturbances in the interior and for some days the transactions were on a limited scale.
