**LOSS OF THE U. S. SLOOP CONCORD.**

We are very sorry to be compelled to state that the report of the loss of the sloop of war Concord is fully confirmed. The whale ship Barclay, which arrived at New Bedford, reports the sailing of the United States sloop of war John Adams, from Cape Town, Cape of Good Hope, having on board the surviving officers and crew of the U. S. sloop of war Concord wrecked in Argus last, at Cape Delgado, near the river Lindy on the East coast of Africa. Captain Boerum, Parser Heart, and one sea man belonging to the Concord, were lost in attempting to land by the swamping of a boat. The John Adams was hourly expected at St. Helena when the Barclay left, at which place it was currently reported that the crew of the John Adams were in a state of mutiny. These are all the details relative to the loss of the Concord which we are able to gather.—N. O. Tropic.

**DIABOLICAL ATTEMPT.**—Upon the oath of Mr. Perrez, a resident of the First Municipality, a young mulatress, aged about twelve years, was brought before Recorder Bertus yesterday upon the charge of an attempt to murder. It seems that Mr. Perrez had employed the slave to take care of his child, an infant not more than eight months of age. Some days ago the infant was observed to be suffering under a complaint that baffled the skill of the attending physician, and at last the parents came to the conclusion that it must have been poisoned. Their suspicions fixed upon its nurse, the girl mentioned above, and after questioning her repeatedly, she at last acknowledged that she had put a quantity of powdered glass into the little sufferer's food! Nor did her cruelty stop here—she had mixed several small pins in a saucer of syrup and compelled the unfortunate infant to swallow them! Not content with this, the female fiend struck the child over the head several times with a bamboo cane, and tried to push a piece of stick down its throat! After fully investigating the charges brought against her, Recorder Bertus committed her to prison to await a further trial. Of its kind, the above is certainly the most horrible transaction ever submitted to our experience.—Pic.
